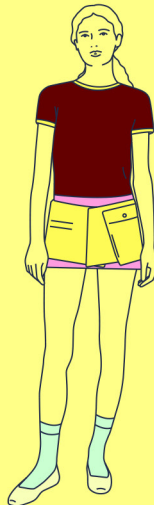
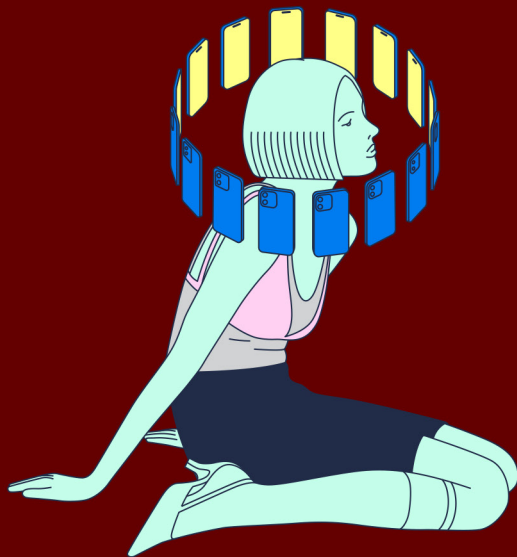


Feminist Organizing Beyond Big Tech

Movements today predominantly organize in environments governed by private platforms. Instagram, TikTok, X, and Facebook do not simply host content. Their algorithms shape visibility, their moderation systems determine what survives, and their data practices map relationships, behaviors, and networks, often exposing communities already facing political, legal, and social risk.

For movements working on sexual and reproductive health and rights, gender justice, and LGBTQ+ issues, this dependency carries consequences. When accounts are removed or content is suppressed, movements lose archives, shared knowledge, organizing continuity,

and control over how their communities are represented and monitored.

In 2025 alone, **Repro Uncensored documented more than 210 cases of digital censorship worldwide** affecting rights-based information. These incidents are not isolated moderation errors. They reflect structural incentives built around profit, surveillance, and extractivism rather than care, consent, or collective governance.

The collective exists because movements need organizing spaces that are durable, accountable, and not governed by commercial platform logics.

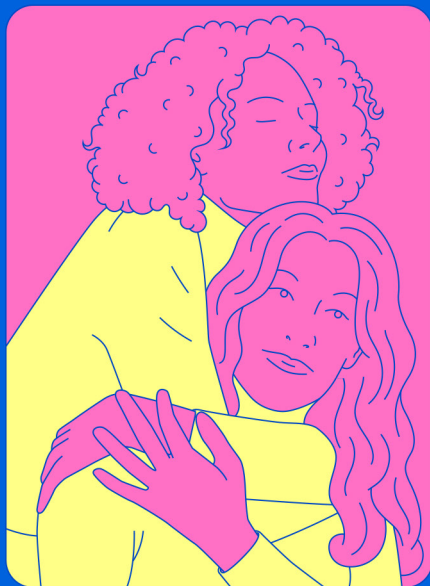


Mainstream platforms are optimized for engagement and advertising, not for long-term movement infrastructure. Their design fragments organizing across feeds, makes visibility dependent on dubious ranking systems, and exposes communities to surveillance and coordinated harassment.

These conditions produce concrete limitations for rights-based organizing:

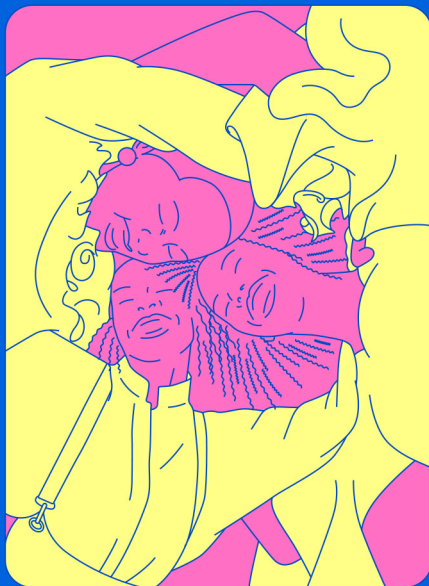
- Loss of continuity when accounts are suspended or reach is throttled.
- Dependence on opaque policies that can shift without accountability.
- Extraction of community data without collective control.
- Inability to host shared decision-making processes transparently.
- Difficulty sustaining transnational and multilingual collaboration without algorithmic interference.

For movements navigating legal risk, stigma, and political repression, relying solely on commercial platforms makes organizing more fragile and more easily disrupted. What is needed is not another social media space, but **shared infrastructure for deliberation, coordination, and collective strategy that movements themselves can govern.**



The Repro Uncensored collective creates spaces to deliberate, coordinate, document knowledge, and make decisions collectively while remaining grounded in real-world action and community needs.

This is not an alternative social media platform. It is a **federated organizing environment** that supports collaboration across autonomous communities while preserving their independence and privacy. Each collective has its own spaces, while collaborating in a broader shared space.



The collective model centers collective governance over platform ownership, data control held by participating communities, federated spaces that allow local autonomy with transnational coordination, and transparent processes for discussion, proposals, and decision-making.

By shifting from platform dependency to shared infrastructure, movements can organize with greater continuity, security, and accountability while maintaining plurality and political autonomy.



The collective is powered by open and community-controlled digital infrastructure built on Decidim and extended through Voca.

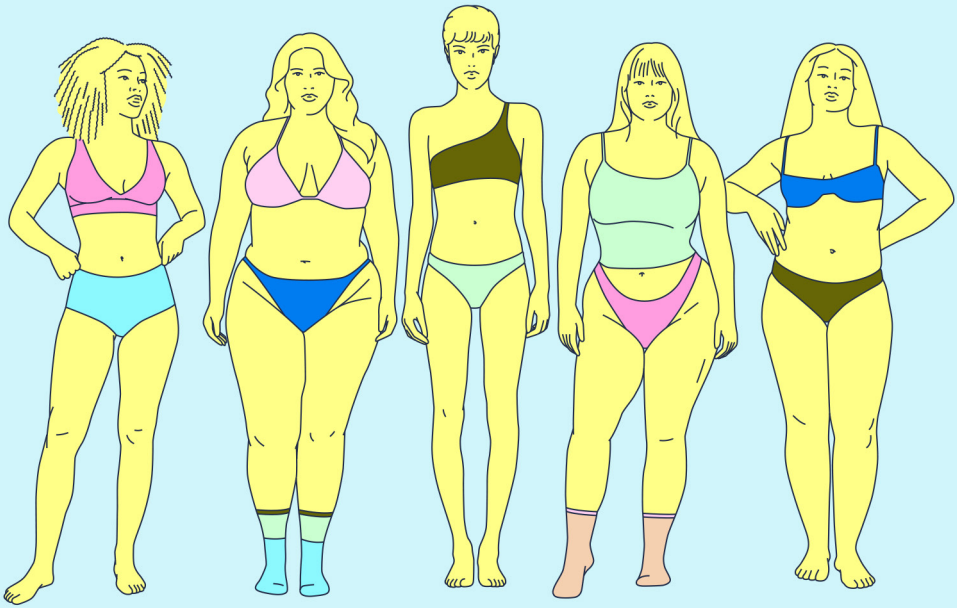
Decidim provides the core tools for participatory governance. It enables communities to create spaces to deliberate, document proposals, and make decisions through transparent and auditable processes. These spaces structure how the collective listens, reacts, and decides together.

Voca extends this foundation by adding interoperable workflows that allow the infrastructure to evolve across contexts. It supports federated organizing by enabling multiple autonomous

communities to operate their own spaces while coordinating across a shared ecosystem without being absorbed into a centralized structure.

Together, this infrastructure ensures that organizing processes, community knowledge, and governance decisions remain collectively owned rather than captured by external platforms. The technical architecture reflects a political commitment: **reducing dependency on GAFAM platforms, avoiding lock-in, and enabling collaboration without forcing uniformity or central control.**

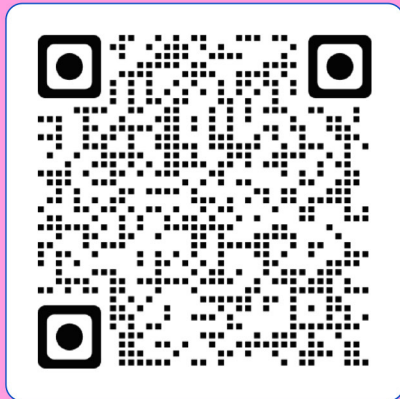
